


Overall Results

- In 2015, the average score of fourth-grade students in DoDEA was 248. This was higher than the average score of 240 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in DoDEA in 2015 (248) was higher than their average score in 2013 (245) and in 2000 (227).
- The percentage of students in DoDEA who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 49 percent in 2015. This percentage was greater than that in 2013 (45 percent) and in 2000 (21 percent).
- The percentage of students in DoDEA who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 90 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (89 percent) and was greater than that in 2000 (69 percent).

Compare the Average Score in 2015 to Other States/Jurisdictions



In 2015, the average score in DoDEA (248) was

- lower than those in 1 state/jurisdiction
- higher than those in 43 states/jurisdictions
- not significantly different from those in 7 states/jurisdictions

DoDEA = Department of Defense Education Activity (overseas and domestic schools)





Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2015, Black students had an average score that was 15 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was narrower than that in 2000 (20 points).
- In 2015, Hispanic students had an average score that was 7 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was narrower than that in 2000 (14 points).
- In 2015, male students in DoDEA had an average score that was higher than that for female students by 3 points.
- Data are not reported for students who were not eligible and eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch in 2015, because reporting standards were not met.
