


### Overall Results

- In 2015, the average score of eighth-grade students in Kansas was 284. This was not significantly different from the average score of 281 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in Kansas in 2015 (284) was lower than their average score in 2013 (290) and was not significantly different from their average score in 2000 (283).
- The percentage of students in Kansas who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 33 percent in 2015. This percentage was smaller than that in 2013 (40 percent) and was not significantly different from that in 2000 (34 percent).
- The percentage of students in Kansas who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 76 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (79 percent) and in 2000 (76 percent).

### Compare the Average Score in 2015 to Other States/Jurisdictions



In 2015, the average score in Kansas (284) was

- lower than those in 10 states/jurisdictions
- higher than those in 18 states/jurisdictions
- not significantly different from those in 23 states/jurisdictions





### Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2015, Black students had an average score that was 27 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2000 (43 points).
- In 2015, Hispanic students had an average score that was 16 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2000 (24 points).
- In 2015, male students in Kansas had an average score that was not significantly different from that for female students.
- In 2015, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 23 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2000 (24 points).
