


Overall Results

- In 2015, the average score of eighth-grade students in New Hampshire was 294. This was higher than the average score of 281 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in New Hampshire in 2015 (294) was not significantly different from their average score in 2013 (296) and was higher than their average score in 2003 (286).
- The percentage of students in New Hampshire who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 46 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (47 percent) and was greater than that in 2003 (35 percent).
- The percentage of students in New Hampshire who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 84 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (84 percent) and was greater than that in 2003 (79 percent).

Compare the Average Score in 2015 to Other States/Jurisdictions



In 2015, the average score in New Hampshire (294) was

- lower than those in 0 states/jurisdictions
- higher than those in 48 states/jurisdictions
- not significantly different from those in 3 states/jurisdictions





Score Gaps for Student Groups

- Data are not reported for Black students in 2015, because reporting standards were not met.
- In 2015, Hispanic students had an average score that was 25 points lower than that for White students. Data are not reported for Hispanic students in 2003, because reporting standards were not met.
- In 2015, male students in New Hampshire had an average score that was not significantly different from that for female students.
- In 2015, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 25 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2003 (21 points).
