


### Overall Results

- In 2015, the average score of fourth-grade students in Nevada was 234. This was lower than the average score of 240 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in Nevada in 2015 (234) was not significantly different from their average score in 2013 (236) and was higher than their average score in 2000 (220).
- The percentage of students in Nevada who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 32 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (34 percent) and was greater than that in 2000 (16 percent).
- The percentage of students in Nevada who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 76 percent in 2015. This percentage was smaller than that in 2013 (80 percent) and was greater than that in 2000 (60 percent).

### Compare the Average Score in 2015 to Other States/Jurisdictions



In 2015, the average score in Nevada (234) was

- lower than those in 38 states/jurisdictions
- higher than those in 0 states/jurisdictions
- not significantly different from those in 13 states/jurisdictions





### Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2015, Black students had an average score that was 28 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2000 (23 points).
- In 2015, Hispanic students had an average score that was 19 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2000 (20 points).
- In 2015, male students in Nevada had an average score that was not significantly different from that for female students.
- In 2015, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 20 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2000 (21 points).
