


Overall Results

- In 2015, the average score of fourth-grade students in New York was 237. This was lower than the average score of 240 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in New York in 2015 (237) was lower than their average score in 2013 (240) and was higher than their average score in 2000 (225).
- The percentage of students in New York who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 35 percent in 2015. This percentage was smaller than that in 2013 (40 percent) and was greater than that in 2000 (21 percent).
- The percentage of students in New York who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 79 percent in 2015. This percentage was smaller than that in 2013 (82 percent) and was greater than that in 2000 (66 percent).

Compare the Average Score in 2015 to Other States/Jurisdictions



In 2015, the average score in New York (237) was

- lower than those in 29 states/jurisdictions
- higher than those in 4 states/jurisdictions
- not significantly different from those in 18 states/jurisdictions





Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2015, Black students had an average score that was 25 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2000 (27 points).
- In 2015, Hispanic students had an average score that was 17 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was narrower than that in 2000 (30 points).
- In 2015, male students in New York had an average score that was not significantly different from that for female students.
- In 2015, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 20 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was narrower than that in 2000 (26 points).
