


### Overall Results

- In 2015, the average score of eighth-grade students in Wisconsin was 289. This was higher than the average score of 281 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in Wisconsin in 2015 (289) was not significantly different from their average score in 2013 (289) and was higher than their average score in 2003 (284).
- The percentage of students in Wisconsin who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 41 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (40 percent) and was greater than that in 2003 (35 percent).
- The percentage of students in Wisconsin who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 78 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (78 percent) and in 2003 (75 percent).

### Compare the Average Score in 2015 to Other States/Jurisdictions



In 2015, the average score in Wisconsin (289) was

- lower than those in 4 states/jurisdictions
- higher than those in 34 states/jurisdictions
- not significantly different from those in 13 states/jurisdictions





### Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2015, Black students had an average score that was 48 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2003 (49 points).
- In 2015, Hispanic students had an average score that was 25 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2003 (28 points).
- In 2015, male students in Wisconsin had an average score that was not significantly different from that for female students.
- In 2015, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 31 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2003 (33 points).
