


Overall Results

- In 2015, the average score of fourth-grade students in Iowa was 243. This was higher than the average score of 240 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in Iowa in 2015 (243) was not significantly different from their average score in 2013 (246) and was higher than their average score in 2000 (231).
- The percentage of students in Iowa who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 44 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (48 percent) and was greater than that in 2000 (26 percent).
- The percentage of students in Iowa who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 84 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (87 percent) and was greater than that in 2000 (75 percent).

Compare the Average Score in 2015 to Other States/Jurisdictions



In 2015, the average score in Iowa (243) was

- lower than those in 6 states/jurisdictions
- higher than those in 26 states/jurisdictions
- not significantly different from those in 19 states/jurisdictions





Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2015, Black students had an average score that was 26 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2000 (16 points).
- In 2015, Hispanic students had an average score that was 21 points lower than that for White students. Data are not reported for Hispanic students in 2000, because reporting standards were not met.
- In 2015, male students in Iowa had an average score that was not significantly different from that for female students.
- In 2015, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 21 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was wider than that in 2000 (14 points).
