


Overall Results

- In 2015, the average score of fourth-grade students in Illinois was 151. This was not significantly different from the average score of 153 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in Illinois in 2015 (151) was higher than their average score in 2009 (148).
- The percentage of students in Illinois who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 35 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2009 (32 percent).
- The percentage of students in Illinois who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 73 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2009 (69 percent).

Compare the Average Score in 2015 to Other States/Jurisdictions



In 2015, the average score in Illinois (151) was

- lower than those in 25 states/jurisdictions
- higher than those in 6 states/jurisdictions
- not significantly different from those in 15 states/jurisdictions

□ 5 states/jurisdictions did not participate in 2015





Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2015, Black students had an average score that was 41 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (44 points).
- In 2015, Hispanic students had an average score that was 29 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was narrower than that in 2009 (35 points).
- In 2015, male students in Illinois had an average score that was not significantly different from that for female students.
- In 2015, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 31 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (34 points).
