


### Overall Results


- In 2015, the average score of eighth-grade students in Illinois was 150. This was lower than the average score of 153 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in Illinois in 2015 (150) was not significantly different from their average score in 2011 (147) and in 2009 (148).
- The percentage of students in Illinois who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 28 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2011 (26 percent) and in 2009 (28 percent).
- The percentage of students in Illinois who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 63 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2011 (60 percent) and in 2009 (61 percent).


### Compare the Average Score in 2015 to Other States/Jurisdictions



- In 2015, the average score in Illinois (150) was
  - lower than those in 29 states/jurisdictions
  - higher than those in 5 states/jurisdictions
  - not significantly different from those in 12 states/jurisdictions
- 5 states/jurisdictions did not participate in 2015

### Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2015, Black students had an average score that was 36 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was narrower than that in 2009 (44 points).
- In 2015, Hispanic students had an average score that was 23 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was narrower than that in 2009 (30 points).
- In 2015, male students in Illinois had an average score that was not significantly different from that for female students.
- In 2015, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 27 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was narrower than that in 2009 (34 points).
