


Overall Results


- In 2015, the average score of fourth-grade students in Kansas was 154. This was not significantly different from the average score of 153 for public school students in the nation.
- The percentage of students in Kansas who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 37 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from the nation (37 percent).
- The percentage of students in Kansas who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 77 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from the nation (75 percent).


Compare the Average Score in 2015 to Other States/Jurisdictions



In 2015, the average score in Kansas (154) was  
■ lower than those in 14 states/jurisdictions  
■ higher than those in 9 states/jurisdictions  
■ not significantly different from those in 23 states/jurisdictions  
■ 5 states/jurisdictions did not participate in 2015

Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2015, Black students had an average score that was 32 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from the nation (33 points).
- In 2015, Hispanic students had an average score that was 23 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from the nation (27 points).
- In 2015, male students in Kansas had an average score that was not significantly different from that for female students.
- In 2015, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 28 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was not significantly different from the nation (28 points).
