


Overall Results

- In 2015, the average score of fourth-grade students in New York was 150. This was lower than the average score of 153 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in New York in 2015 (150) was not significantly different from their average score in 2009 (148).
- The percentage of students in New York who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 33 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2009 (30 percent).
- The percentage of students in New York who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 72 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2009 (70 percent).

Compare the Average Score in 2015 to Other States/Jurisdictions



- In 2015, the average score in New York (150) was
- lower than those in 32 states/jurisdictions
 - higher than those in 6 states/jurisdictions
 - not significantly different from those in 8 states/jurisdictions
 - 5 states/jurisdictions did not participate in 2015





Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2015, Black students had an average score that was 34 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (34 points).
- In 2015, Hispanic students had an average score that was 28 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (31 points).
- In 2015, male students in New York had an average score that was not significantly different from that for female students.
- In 2015, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 26 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (27 points).
