


Overall Results


- In 2015, the average score of fourth-grade students in Oklahoma was 153. This was not significantly different from the average score of 153 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in Oklahoma in 2015 (153) was higher than their average score in 2009 (148).
- The percentage of students in Oklahoma who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 34 percent in 2015. This percentage was greater than that in 2009 (28 percent).
- The percentage of students in Oklahoma who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 79 percent in 2015. This percentage was greater than that in 2009 (73 percent).


Compare the Average Score in 2015 to Other States/Jurisdictions



- In 2015, the average score in Oklahoma (153) was
  - lighter blue: lower than those in 20 states/jurisdictions
  - dark blue: higher than those in 9 states/jurisdictions
  - orange: not significantly different from those in 17 states/jurisdictions
  - white: 5 states/jurisdictions did not participate in 2015

Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2015, Black students had an average score that was 23 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was narrower than that in 2009 (32 points).
- In 2015, Hispanic students had an average score that was 21 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (26 points).
- In 2015, male students in Oklahoma had an average score that was higher than that for female students by 4 points.
- In 2015, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 18 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (20 points).
