


Overall Results


- In 2015, the average score of fourth-grade students in Texas was 155. This was not significantly different from the average score of 153 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in Texas in 2015 (155) was higher than their average score in 2009 (148).
- The percentage of students in Texas who performed at or above the NAEP Proficient level was 39 percent in 2015. This percentage was greater than that in 2009 (29 percent).
- The percentage of students in Texas who performed at or above the NAEP Basic level was 76 percent in 2015. This percentage was greater than that in 2009 (70 percent).


Compare the Average Score in 2015 to Other States/Jurisdictions



- In 2015, the average score in Texas (155) was
  - lower than those in 10 states/jurisdictions
  - higher than those in 8 states/jurisdictions
  - not significantly different from those in 28 states/jurisdictions
- 5 states/jurisdictions did not participate in 2015

Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2015, Black students had an average score that was 29 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (29 points).
- In 2015, Hispanic students had an average score that was 27 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (31 points).
- In 2015, male students in Texas had an average score that was not significantly different from that for female students.
- In 2015, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 30 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (31 points).
