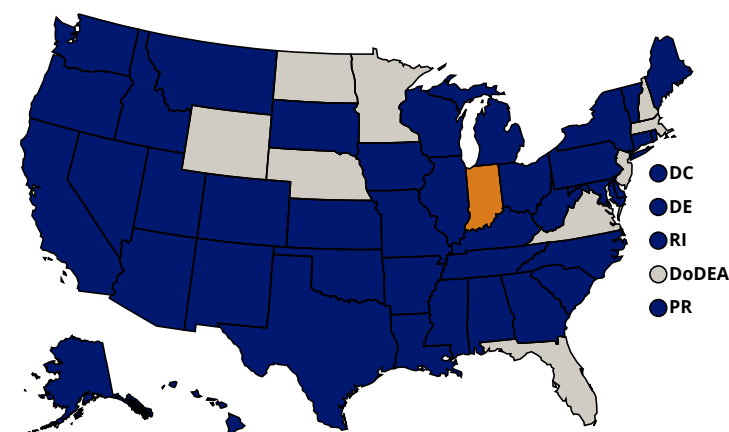


Overall Results

- In 2017, the average score of fourth-grade students in Indiana was 247. This was higher than the average score of 239 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in Indiana in 2017 (247) was not significantly different from their average score in 2015 (248) and was higher than their average score in 2000 (233).
- The percentage of students in Indiana who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 48 percent in 2017. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2015 (50 percent) and was greater than that in 2000 (30 percent).
- The percentage of students in Indiana who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 86 percent in 2017. This percentage was smaller than that in 2015 (89 percent) and was greater than that in 2000 (77 percent).

Compare the Average Score in 2017 to Other States/Jurisdictions



In 2017, the average score in Indiana (247) was

- lower than those in 0 states/jurisdictions
- higher than those in 42 states/jurisdictions
- not significantly different from those in 10 states/jurisdictions

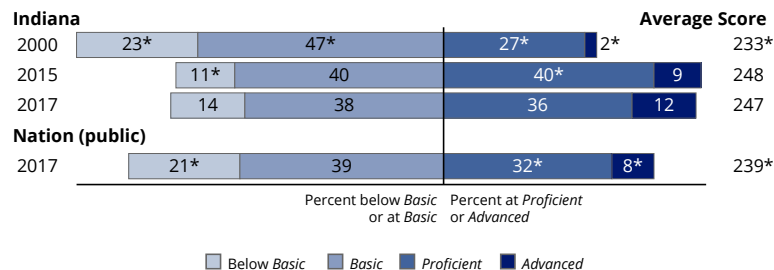

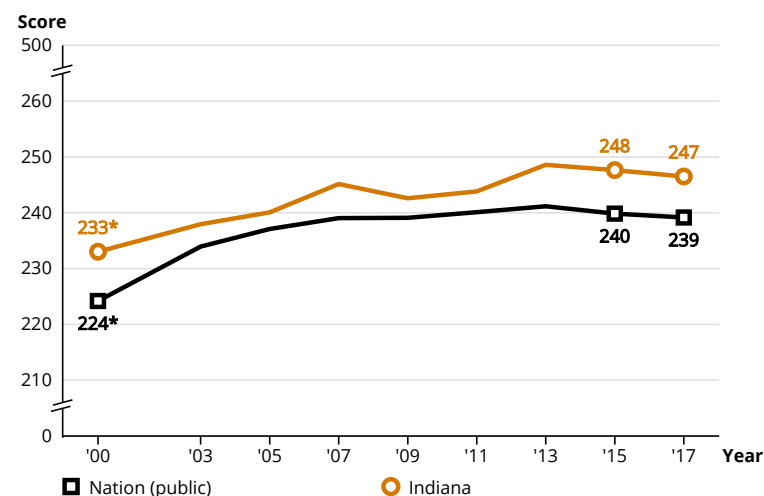

Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2017, Black students had an average score that was 25 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2000 (25 points).
- In 2017, Hispanic students had an average score that was 17 points lower than that for White students. Data are not reported for Hispanic students in 2000, because reporting standards were not met.
- In 2017, male students in Indiana had an average score that was not significantly different from that for female students.
- In 2017, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 22 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2000 (20 points).
