


## Overall Results

- In 2017, the average score of fourth-grade students in Kansas was 241. This was higher than the average score of 239 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in Kansas in 2017 (241) was not significantly different from their average score in 2015 (241) and was higher than their average score in 2000 (232).
- The percentage of students in Kansas who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 42 percent in 2017. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2015 (41 percent) and was greater than that in 2000 (29 percent).
- The percentage of students in Kansas who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 82 percent in 2017. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2015 (83 percent) and was greater than that in 2000 (76 percent).

## Compare the Average Score in 2017 to Other States/Jurisdictions



In 2017, the average score in Kansas (241) was

- lower than those in 11 states/jurisdictions
- higher than those in 23 states/jurisdictions
- not significantly different from those in 18 states/jurisdictions





## Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2017, Black students had an average score that was 23 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2000 (29 points).
- In 2017, Hispanic students had an average score that was 13 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2000 (24 points).
- In 2017, male students in Kansas had an average score that was not significantly different from that for female students.
- In 2017, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 21 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2000 (22 points).
