


### Overall Results

- In 2017, the average score of eighth-grade students in Kansas was 285. This was higher than the average score of 282 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in Kansas in 2017 (285) was not significantly different from their average score in 2015 (284) and in 2000 (283).
- The percentage of students in Kansas who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 35 percent in 2017. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2015 (33 percent) and in 2000 (34 percent).
- The percentage of students in Kansas who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 74 percent in 2017. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2015 (76 percent) and in 2000 (76 percent).

In 2017, the average score in Kansas (285) was  
  lower than those in 10 states/jurisdictions  
  higher than those in 26 states/jurisdictions  
  not significantly different from those in 16 states/jurisdictions





### Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2017, Black students had an average score that was 34 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2000 (43 points).
- In 2017, Hispanic students had an average score that was 24 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2000 (24 points).
- In 2017, male students in Kansas had an average score that was higher than that for female students by 5 points.
- In 2017, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 28 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2000 (24 points).
