


## Overall Results

- In 2017, the average score of fourth-grade students in Louisiana was 229. This was lower than the average score of 239 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in Louisiana in 2017 (229) was lower than their average score in 2015 (234) and was higher than their average score in 2000 (218).
- The percentage of students in Louisiana who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 27 percent in 2017. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2015 (30 percent) and was greater than that in 2000 (14 percent).
- The percentage of students in Louisiana who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 71 percent in 2017. This percentage was smaller than that in 2015 (78 percent) and was greater than that in 2000 (57 percent).

## Compare the Average Score in 2017 to Other States/Jurisdictions



In 2017, the average score in Louisiana (229) was

- lower than those in 45 states/jurisdictions
- higher than those in 1 state/jurisdiction
- not significantly different from those in 6 states/jurisdictions





## Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2017, Black students had an average score that was 26 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2000 (25 points).
- In 2017, Hispanic students had an average score that was 19 points lower than that for White students. Data are not reported for Hispanic students in 2000, because reporting standards were not met.
- In 2017, male students in Louisiana had an average score that was not significantly different from that for female students.
- In 2017, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 22 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2000 (22 points).
