


Overall Results

- In 2017, the average score of fourth-grade students in New Mexico was 230. This was lower than the average score of 239 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in New Mexico in 2017 (230) was not significantly different from their average score in 2015 (231) and was higher than their average score in 2000 (213).
- The percentage of students in New Mexico who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 27 percent in 2017. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2015 (27 percent) and was greater than that in 2000 (12 percent).
- The percentage of students in New Mexico who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 69 percent in 2017. This percentage was smaller than that in 2015 (73 percent) and was greater than that in 2000 (50 percent).

In 2017, the average score in New Mexico (230) was

■ not significantly different from those in 6 states/jurisdictions





Score Gaps for Student Groups

- Data are not reported for Black students in 2017, because reporting standards were not met.
- In 2017, Hispanic students had an average score that was 19 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2000 (20 points).
- In 2017, male students in New Mexico had an average score that was not significantly different from that for female students.
- In 2017, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 24 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2000 (22 points).
