


Overall Results

- In 2017, the average score of eighth-grade students in Utah was 287. This was higher than the average score of 282 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in Utah in 2017 (287) was not significantly different from their average score in 2015 (286) and was higher than their average score in 2000 (274).
- The percentage of students in Utah who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 39 percent in 2017. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2015 (38 percent) and was greater than that in 2000 (25 percent).
- The percentage of students in Utah who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 75 percent in 2017. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2015 (76 percent) and was greater than that in 2000 (66 percent).

In 2017, the average score in Utah (287) was

DoDEA = Department of Defense Education Activity (overseas and domestic schools)





Score Gaps for Student Groups

- Data are not reported for Black students in 2017, because reporting standards were not met.
- In 2017, Hispanic students had an average score that was 31 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2000 (33 points).
- In 2017, male students in Utah had an average score that was not significantly different from that for female students.
- In 2017, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 26 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2000 (26 points).
