


Overall Results

- In 2017, the average score of eighth-grade students in Alabama was 258. This was lower than the average score of 265 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in Alabama in 2017 (258) was not significantly different from their average score in 2015 (259) and in 1998 (255).
- The percentage of students in Alabama who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 28 percent in 2017. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2015 (26 percent) and was greater than that in 1998 (22 percent).
- The percentage of students in Alabama who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 67 percent in 2017. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2015 (71 percent) and in 1998 (67 percent).

In 2017, the average score in Alabama (258) was

■ not significantly different from those in 9 states/jurisdictions





Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2017, Black students had an average score that was 27 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1998 (28 points).
- In 2017, Hispanic students had an average score that was 25 points lower than that for White students. Data are not reported for Hispanic students in 1998, because reporting standards were not met.
- In 2017, female students in Alabama had an average score that was higher than that for male students by 9 points.
- In 2017, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 27 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1998 (24 points).
