


### Overall Results

- In 2017, the average score of fourth-grade students in Florida was 228. This was higher than the average score of 221 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in Florida in 2017 (228) was not significantly different from their average score in 2015 (227) and was higher than their average score in 1998 (206).
- The percentage of students in Florida who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 41 percent in 2017. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2015 (39 percent) and was greater than that in 1998 (22 percent).
- The percentage of students in Florida who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 75 percent in 2017. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2015 (75 percent) and was greater than that in 1998 (53 percent).

### Compare the Average Score in 2017 to Other States/Jurisdictions



In 2017, the average score in Florida (228) was  
  lower than those in 3 states/jurisdictions  
  higher than those in 37 states/jurisdictions  
  not significantly different from those in 11 states/jurisdictions





### Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2017, Black students had an average score that was 26 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1998 (31 points).
- In 2017, Hispanic students had an average score that was 14 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1998 (20 points).
- In 2017, female students in Florida had an average score that was higher than that for male students by 4 points.
- In 2017, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 23 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1998 (29 points).
