


Overall Results

- In 2017, the average score of eighth-grade students in Illinois was 267. This was not significantly different from the average score of 265 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in Illinois in 2017 (267) was not significantly different from their average score in 2015 (267) and in 2003 (266).
- The percentage of students in Illinois who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 36 percent in 2017. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2015 (35 percent) and in 2003 (35 percent).
- The percentage of students in Illinois who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 77 percent in 2017. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2015 (77 percent) and in 2003 (77 percent).

In 2017, the average score in Illinois (267) was
 ■ lower than those in 8 states/jurisdictions
 ■ higher than those in 18 states/jurisdictions
 ■ not significantly different from those in 25 states/jurisdictions





Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2017, Black students had an average score that was 29 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2003 (29 points).
- In 2017, Hispanic students had an average score that was 16 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was narrower than that in 2003 (26 points).
- In 2017, female students in Illinois had an average score that was higher than that for male students by 11 points. This performance gap was wider than that in 2003 (6 points).
- In 2017, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 22 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was narrower than that in 2003 (27 points).
