


### Overall Results

- In 2017, the average score of fourth-grade students in Kansas was 223. This was higher than the average score of 221 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in Kansas in 2017 (223) was not significantly different from their average score in 2015 (221) and in 1998 (221).
- The percentage of students in Kansas who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 37 percent in 2017. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2015 (35 percent) and in 1998 (34 percent).
- The percentage of students in Kansas who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 70 percent in 2017. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2015 (68 percent) and in 1998 (70 percent).

In 2017, the average score in Kansas (223) was

  higher than those in 19 states/jurisdictions  
  not significantly different from those in 23 states/jurisdictions





### Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2017, Black students had an average score that was 25 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1998 (30 points).
- In 2017, Hispanic students had an average score that was 12 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1998 (25 points).
- In 2017, female students in Kansas had an average score that was higher than that for male students by 5 points.
- In 2017, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 22 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1998 (23 points).
