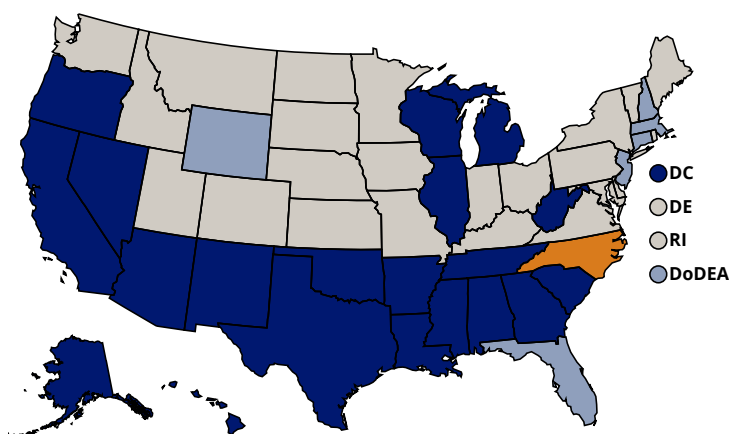


Overall Results

- In 2017, the average score of fourth-grade students in North Carolina was 224. This was higher than the average score of 221 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in North Carolina in 2017 (224) was not significantly different from their average score in 2015 (226) and was higher than their average score in 1998 (213).
- The percentage of students in North Carolina who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 39 percent in 2017. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2015 (38 percent) and was greater than that in 1998 (27 percent).
- The percentage of students in North Carolina who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 69 percent in 2017. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2015 (73 percent) and was greater than that in 1998 (58 percent).

Compare the Average Score in 2017 to Other States/Jurisdictions



In 2017, the average score in North Carolina (224) was

- lower than those in 7 states/jurisdictions
- higher than those in 21 states/jurisdictions
- not significantly different from those in 23 states/jurisdictions

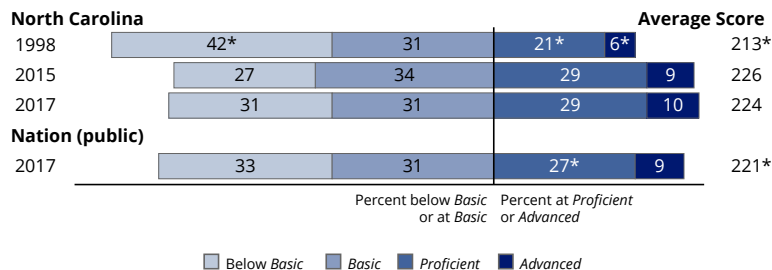

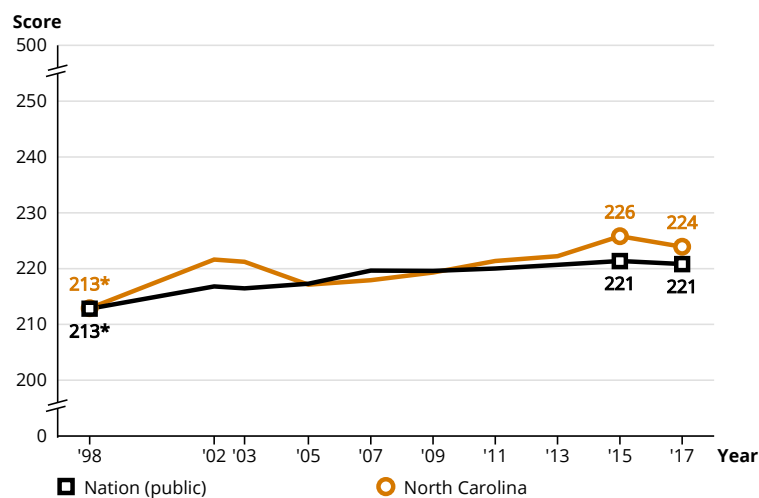

Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2017, Black students had an average score that was 24 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1998 (30 points).
- In 2017, Hispanic students had an average score that was 24 points lower than that for White students. Data are not reported for Hispanic students in 1998, because reporting standards were not met.
- In 2017, female students in North Carolina had an average score that was higher than that for male students by 6 points.
- In 2017, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 25 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1998 (26 points).
