


Overall Results

- In 2017, the average score of fourth-grade students in North Dakota was 222. This was not significantly different from the average score of 221 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in North Dakota in 2017 (222) was lower than their average score in 2015 (225) and was not significantly different from their average score in 2002 (224).
- The percentage of students in North Dakota who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 34 percent in 2017. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2015 (37 percent) and in 2002 (34 percent).
- The percentage of students in North Dakota who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 70 percent in 2017. This percentage was smaller than that in 2015 (73 percent) and was not significantly different from that in 2002 (71 percent).

 not significantly different from those in 20 states/jurisdictions





Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2017, Black students had an average score that was 20 points lower than that for White students. Data are not reported for Black students in 2002, because reporting standards were not met.
- In 2017, Hispanic students had an average score that was 17 points lower than that for White students. Data are not reported for Hispanic students in 2002, because reporting standards were not met.
- In 2017, female students in North Dakota had an average score that was higher than that for male students by 10 points.
- In 2017, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 21 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was wider than that in 2002 (15 points).
