


Overall Results

- In 2017, the average score of eighth-grade students in Oklahoma was 261. This was lower than the average score of 265 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in Oklahoma in 2017 (261) was not significantly different from their average score in 2015 (263) and was lower than their average score in 1998 (265).
- The percentage of students in Oklahoma who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 28 percent in 2017. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2015 (29 percent) and in 1998 (30 percent).
- The percentage of students in Oklahoma who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 74 percent in 2017. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2015 (76 percent) and was smaller than that in 1998 (80 percent).

Compare the Average Score in 2017 to Other States/Jurisdictions



In 2017, the average score in Oklahoma (261) was
lower than those in 33 states/jurisdictions
higher than those in 6 states/jurisdictions
not significantly different from those in 12 states/jurisdictions





Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2017, Black students had an average score that was 19 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1998 (16 points).
- In 2017, Hispanic students had an average score that was 11 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1998 (14 points).
- In 2017, female students in Oklahoma had an average score that was higher than that for male students by 8 points.
- In 2017, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 18 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1998 (13 points).
