


Overall Results

- In 2017, the average score of eighth-grade students in Wisconsin was 269. This was higher than the average score of 265 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in Wisconsin in 2017 (269) was not significantly different from their average score in 2015 (270) and in 1998 (265).
- The percentage of students in Wisconsin who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 39 percent in 2017. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2015 (39 percent) and was greater than that in 1998 (34 percent).
- The percentage of students in Wisconsin who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 79 percent in 2017. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2015 (79 percent) and in 1998 (78 percent).

Compare the Average Score in 2017 to Other States/Jurisdictions



In 2017, the average score in Wisconsin (269) was

- lower than those in 6 states/jurisdictions
- higher than those in 24 states/jurisdictions
- not significantly different from those in 21 states/jurisdictions





Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2017, Black students had an average score that was 36 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1998 (35 points).
- In 2017, Hispanic students had an average score that was 20 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1998 (13 points).
- In 2017, female students in Wisconsin had an average score that was higher than that for male students by 14 points.
- In 2017, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 24 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1998 (20 points).
