


2019 Reading State Snapshot Report Tennessee Grade 8 Public Schools

Overall Results

- In 2019, the average score of eighth-grade students in Tennessee was 262. This was not significantly different from the average score of 262 for students in the nation.
- The average score for students in Tennessee in 2019 (262) was not significantly different from their average score in 2017 (262) and was higher than their average score in 1998 (258).
- The percentage of students in Tennessee who performed at or above the NAEP Proficient level was 32 percent in 2019. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2017 (31 percent) and was higher than that in 1998 (27 percent).
- The percentage of students in Tennessee who performed at or above the *NAEP Basic* level was 73 percent in 2019. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2017 (73 percent) and in 1998 (71 percent).




NAEP Achievement-Level Percentages and Average Score Results

Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2019, Black students had an average score that was 23 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1998 (29 points).
- In 2019, Hispanic students had an average score that was 15 points lower than that for White students. Data are not reported for Hispanic students in 1998, because reporting standards were not met.
- In 2019, female students in Tennessee had an average score that was higher than that for male students by 12 points.
- In 2019, students who were eligible for the National School Lunch Program (NSLP), had an average score that was 20 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was narrower than that in 1998 (27 points).
