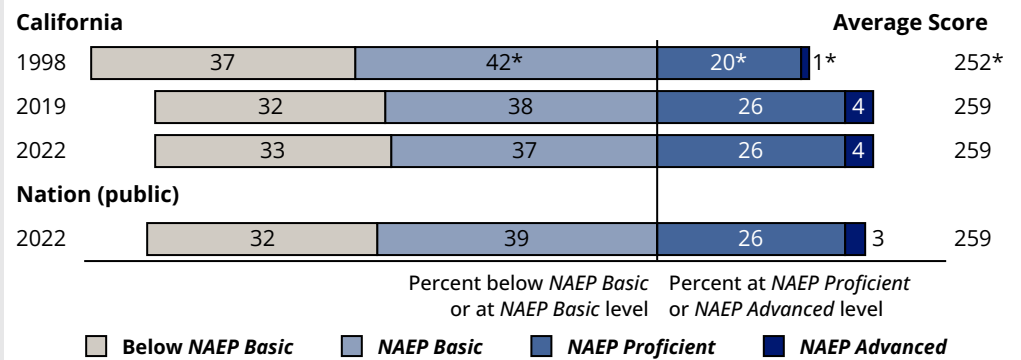


OVERALL RESULTS

- In 2022, the average score of eighth-grade students in California was 259. This was not significantly different from the average score of 259 for students in the nation.
- The average score for students in California in 2022 (259) was not significantly different from their average score in 2019 (259) and was higher than their average score in 1998 (252).
- The percentage of students in California who performed at or above the *NAEP Proficient* level was 30 percent in 2022. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2019 (30 percent) and was greater than that in 1998 (21 percent).
- The percentage of students in California who performed at or above the *NAEP Basic* level was 67 percent in 2022. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2019 (68 percent) and in 1998 (63 percent).

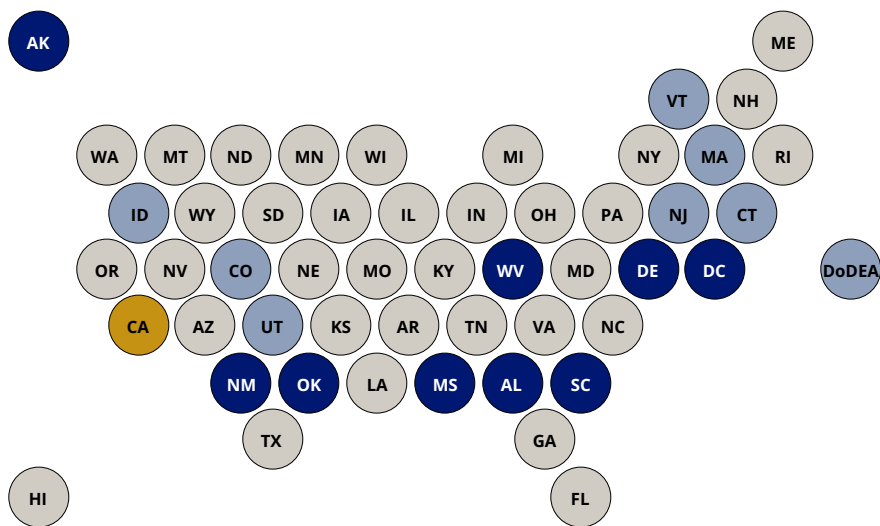
NAEP ACHIEVEMENT-LEVEL PERCENTAGES AND AVERAGE SCORE RESULTS

COMPARE THE AVERAGE SCORE IN 2022 TO OTHER STATES/JURISDICTIONS

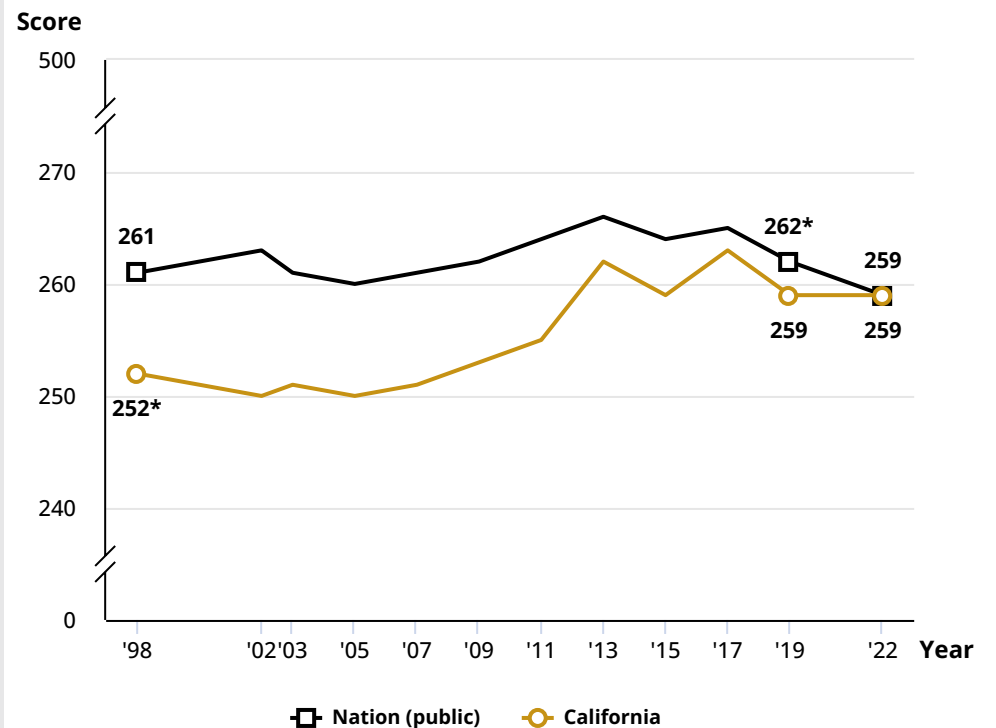


In 2022, the average score in California (259) was

- lower than those in 8 states/jurisdictions
- higher than those in 9 states/jurisdictions
- not significantly different from those in 34 states/jurisdictions

SCORE GAPS FOR STUDENT GROUPS

- In 2022, Black students had an average score that was 23 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1998 (30 points).
- In 2022, Hispanic students had an average score that was 19 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was narrower than that in 1998 (30 points).
- In 2022, male students in California had an average score that was lower than that for female students by 5 points.
- In 2022, students who were eligible for the National School Lunch Program (NSLP) had an average score that was 26 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1998 (32 points).
