

2022 READING STATE SNAPSHOT REPORT VERMONT GRADE 8 PUBLIC SCHOOLS

OVERALL RESULTS

- In 2022, the average score of eighth-grade students in Vermont was 264. This was higher than the average score of 259 for students in the nation.
- The average score for students in Vermont in 2022 (264) was lower than their average score in 2019 (268) and in 2002 (272).
- The percentage of students in Vermont who performed at or above the *NAEP Proficient* level was 34 percent in 2022. This percentage was smaller than that in 2019 (40 percent) and in 2002 (40 percent).
- The percentage of students in Vermont who performed at or above the *NAEP Basic* level was 73 percent in 2022. This percentage was smaller than that in 2019 (77 percent) and in 2002 (82 percent).


NAEP ACHIEVEMENT-LEVEL PERCENTAGES AND AVERAGE SCORE RESULTS



SCORE GAPS FOR STUDENT GROUPS

- In 2022, Black students had an average score that was not significantly different from that for White students. Data are not reported for Black students in 2002, because reporting standards were not met.
- Data are not reported for Hispanic students in 2022, because reporting standards were not met.
- In 2022, male students in Vermont had an average score that was lower than that for female students by 13 points.
- In 2022, students who were eligible for the National School Lunch Program (NSLP) had an average score that was 17 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2002 (19 points).
