

HIGH SCHOOL AND BEYOND
PARENT QUESTIONNAIRE CODEBOOK

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1. GENERAL DESIGN

The Parent Survey of High School and Beyond is a study of the parents of 1980 high school seniors and sophomores in the United States. Information was obtained in Autumn 1980. High School and Beyond is a national longitudinal study of the cohorts of 1980 high school seniors and sophomores in the United States. At this time (August, 1981) information on these cohorts at only one time point has been obtained, in Spring 1980. It is intended that information will be obtained on these two cohorts through the period of early adulthood by means of periodic resurveys of subsamples of students surveyed in the base year.

The Parent Survey is sponsored by the National Center for Education Statistics and the Office of Education and Dissemination. High School and Beyond is part of a larger program of national longitudinal surveys of American youth initiated by the National Center for Education Statistics with the cohort of 1972 high school seniors (The National Longitudinal Study of the High School Class of 1972). That cohort has been followed through 1979 by means of four resurveys. The overall multi-cohort, multi-wave design is intended to make possible more powerful analyses of problems involving education than would be possible with unrelated studies.

2. AVAILABLE PARENT DATA

A subsample of the seniors and sophomores surveyed in High School and Beyond was drawn. Questionnaires were administered to one parent of each of these students. These data, which concentrate on financing of post-secondary education, are available for analysis with

or without the student data. The questionnaires contain a number of items in common with the data on the student questionnaires, and there are a number of items in common between the parent-of-sophomore and parent-of-senior questionnaires.¹ Questionnaires were translated into Spanish and parents who requested Spanish-language questionnaires were administered the Spanish questionnaire.²

3. DATA FILE

The Parent File contains the data from questionnaires completed by a national sample of parents of seniors and parents of sophomores. The data file has been prepared to facilitate use of standard statistical software packages. Other available files are:

File 1: Student File. Questionnaires were administered to a national sample of sophomores and seniors, covering a number of areas including background, school activities, out-of-school activities, attitudes, post-high-school plans and aspirations. The questionnaires contain a number of items in common with the data on the 1972 cohort.

File 2: School File. School questionnaire data are contained in this file. These data can be merged with data from the student file because there are common identification codes.

¹For the information of persons planning research on comparable populations, the items in these questionnaires, and the questionnaires as a whole, are in the public domain and can be used without permission. However, NCES would like to be informed of research using parts of the HS&B instruments, for the potential value to other research investigators. HS&B tests are not in the public domain because of the test security necessitated by future use of the same items in resurveys of the HS&B cohorts. Further information about the tests can be obtained from NCES.

²Standard translation-retranslation methods were used in creating the Spanish questionnaires to insure that the original meaning was preserved. Spanish-language questionnaires were used by 41 parents of seniors and 45 parents of sophomores.

- File 3: Language File. File 1 contains an indicator for each student who reported some non-English language experiences. File 3 contains this language usage information, with records only for these students.
- File 4: Teacher Comment File. Teachers in the sampled schools were asked to respond to several questions concerning their knowledge of and evaluations of students in the HS&B sample. This information is useful primarily when merged with data from the student file. These data can be merged with student data because there are common identification codes.
- File 6: Twin File. This file will have the same format as file 1, will contain student questionnaire and test data for both members of each pair of twins.

4. SAMPLING

4.1 Overview

The sample of parents was selected in two stages. At stage one, a systematic subsample of cooperating schools was selected. At stage two, a subset of cooperating students was selected within each stage-one school; their parents were then contacted for an interview. After the data collection phase was completed, design weights and post-stratification weights were appended to the data. These weights project the parents sample to the universe of students from which it was selected.

4.2. Sample Selection

Stage One -- School Selection For the Parents Survey, 312 schools were systematically selected from the 1,015 schools that cooperated in the student survey. Prior to selection, the schools were placed into the twenty-seven superstrata to which they were assigned for the selection of sample students. Within each superstratum, the schools were ordered by their selection sequence number. This stratification placed the cooperating schools in the same relative order in which they appeared in the school universe frame.

Of the 312 selected schools, 304 were considered in-scope. Eligible schools were those which had administered tests to sophomores or seniors. Eight were eliminated because none of their students had taken the HS&B tests. In order to maintain the initial sample of 312 schools, 8 additional schools were randomly selected from the remaining 703 cooperating schools.

Stage Two -- Student Selection: At stage two, students who had taken the HS&B test were systematically selected within each eligible school. Students were eligible for selection if they answered at least one question on the reading, math, or vocabulary test. Nonsample twins and triplets were ineligible. Three hundred and two schools contained eligible seniors and 307 schools contained eligible sophomores; the sampling frame contained 7,888 eligible seniors and 8,848 eligible sophomores.

Twelve students in each grade were selected from all eligible students within each selected school. Some students were included in the sample with certainty. Previously, a sample of students had been selected for use in the reliability study retest; these students were randomly selected with a maximum of one per school. For this sample, all reliability study students who met the eligibility criteria were included in the sample with certainty. In those schools and grades where a reliability student was selected with certainty, 11 additional students were systematically selected from the eligible pool of students (minus the reliability student). In all other schools and grades, a

systematic sample of twelve eligible students was selected.¹ In schools that had less than 12 eligible students per grade, all eligible students were included in the sample. A total of 3,654 sophomores and 3,547 seniors were selected. Table 1 presents the sample sizes and sampling frame totals.

A backup sample of two students in each grade was selected within each school; these were designed to be used in the event that the selected students were found to be out-of-scope. Only 10 students were found to be out-of-scope

¹Since the selection of the reliability student was made on an equal probability basis, all students selected for the parents sample can be viewed as an equal probability sample. Note, however, that selection for the Parents Survey was conditional upon students having taken HS&B tests, whereas selection for the reliability sample was unrestricted. By "systematic sampling," we mean selection using a skip interval and a random start.

during the survey. Of these, 7 of these students had no guardian and 3 were ineligible for other reasons (AFS International exchange students selected in error). Each was replaced with a random member of the backup sample selected from the same grade and school.

From item 2 of the student identification pages, we were able to obtain the parents' names and addresses. If the student reported both a male and female parent, a letter was sent to the female. If only one parent was mentioned, the letter was addressed to that parent. Table 2 shows the completion rates for the parents sample by superstratum and grade.

4.3. Weighting

The sample estimation weights for the parents' data were designed to: (1) compensate for varying student selection probabilities, (2) produce national projections, and (3) compensate for differential cooperation rates among parents across schools within superstratum and grade. These weights were developed in three steps. First, the student weights were used as the initial parent weights. Second, a ratio adjustment factor was calculated so that the sum of the parent weights within each grade and school equalled the corresponding sum of student weights; these weights were then ratio adjusted to the superstratum totals. Finally, poststratification weights were developed on the basis of racial category and school type.

Step 1 The first step was to attach the overall design weight of the student (DW_1) to the respective parent data. A student's design weight equals the number of students that individual represents in the population or universe. The design weight itself is composed of a number of factors that reflect the two-stage nature of the students' sample. The components of the student design weight are:

1. The probability of selection of the cooperating school within its superstratum
2. An adjustment factor for out-of-scope and refusal schools by superstratum
3. The probability of selection of the student within the grade of the selected cooperating school
4. An adjustment factor that accounts for ineligible and nonresponding students within each grade and school

The product of these four factors equals the overall design weight for each sampled student.

Step 2 The next step in the weighting plan required two ratio adjustments, within each school and within each superstratum, so that the sum of the parent weights would equal the sum of the student sample weights by superstratum and grade. The first adjustment factor (AF_1) developed is a ratio of the sum of the student weights (DW_1) to the sum of the initial parent weights within each grade of each school. It is written as:

$$AF_1 = \frac{\sum DW_1 \text{ for all responding students in each school by grade}}{\sum DW_1 \text{ for all responding parents in each school by grade}}$$

This factor, AF_1 , adjusts for those students who had not taken the HS&B test and projects the subsample of that subgroup to the eligible pool within each school and grade.

The product of the initial parent weights and AF_1 ($DW_1 * AF_1 = DW_2$) was used to calculate the second ratio, which adjusts the sum of the weights of the parent sample to the sum of the weights of the student sample by superstratum. This factor equals:

$$AF_2 = \frac{\sum DW_1 \text{ for all responding students in each superstratum by grade}}{\sum DW_2 \text{ for all responding parents in each superstratum by grade}}$$

The initial parent weight (DW_1) was multiplied by the product of AF_1 and AF_2 . Thus, the weight for each parent case at this point equals:

$$DW_p = DW_1 \times AF_1 \times AF_2$$

where DW_p equals the parent design weight after step-two ratio adjustment and DW_1 equals the initial parent weight.

Step 3 Using the weights developed in step two, we tabulated population projections across four race-ethnicity categories (Hispanic, non-Hispanic Black, Other¹, and Unknown); nine school types (Regular Public, Alternative Public, Cuban Hispanic Public, Other Hispanic Public, Regular Catholic, Black Catholic, Cuban Hispanic Catholic, Elite Other Private, and Other Private); and two grades (sophomore, senior). We then compared these totals to the sum of weights within these cells from the student data. These results are presented in Table 3. Poststratification ratio adjustment factors were developed for each school type/race/grade combination. This factor equals:

$$PSF = \frac{\sum DW_1 \text{ for each responding student in each racial category by grade and school type}}{\sum DW_p \text{ for each responding parent in each racial category by grade and school type}}$$

The final weight for each parent case equals:

$$W_p = DW_p \times PSF$$

where DW_p equals the parent design weight after step-two ratio adjustment and DW_1 equals the initial parent weight.

¹The "Other" category includes majority Whites, Asians, Pacific Islanders, American Indians and Alaskan Natives.

In order to avoid problems in subsequent data analysis, we decided not to collapse any of the race/school type/grade cells in this data structure any further even though empty cells existed. Empty cells exist whenever there are cooperating students in a cell but no cooperating parents (see, for example, the cell for Hispanic/other Private schools). Empty cells account for less than two-tenths of 1 percent for sophomores and less than three-tenths of 1 percent for seniors. Table 4 presents the differences between the final weighted data and the final weighted student data by race, grade, and school type. With the exception of the empty cells, within cell projections are equal for students and parents. Empty cells also cause minor discrepancies in row and column totals for parents and students.

5. FIELD PROCEDURES

The data were collected through a combination of mailed out questionnaires, telephone interviews, and personal interviews. All questionnaires were mailed by October 10, 1980. On November 3, 1980 the first reminder calls were made by NORC interviewers to those respondents whose questionnaires had not been received by NORC. On November 17, 1980 local personal interviews and long-distance telephone interviews were started. December 1, 1980 was the first date for long-distance personal interviews. The field period was closed December 31, 1980. NORC staff edited the questionnaires for completeness of a subset of key questions.¹ Editors attempted to retrieve missing key information by telephone.

¹Parents of sophomore key questions were numbers 1, 5, 15, 17, 18, 20, 22, 24, 25, 26, 62, 63, 64, 65, 66, 67, and 68. Parents of senior key questions were 1, 5, 12, 13, 14, 15, 21, 22, 24, 26, 28, 64, 65, 66, 67, 68, 70, 71, 72, and 73. If missing information occurred only in the section regarding income, assets, and debts, retrieval procedures were carried out only in cases where it appeared that the respondent did not attempt to answer the questions in that section from the beginning to end.

6. DATA PREPARATION

6.1. Coding and Data Entry

Parent questionnaires were coded, then key entered. The data tapes were cleaned by checking ranges in individual items and by interitem consistency checks. When there were questionable values, the original questionnaires were reviewed and, when possible, the values were corrected.

6.2. Error and Missing Data Codes

To facilitate the comparison of the parent data with the student data, the error and missing data codes defined for the parent data file correspond to those used with the student data file. The codes on the parent data file are as follows:

- 6 - Multiple Response. More than one response where only one response was called for.
- 7 - Refusal. The respondent refused to answer an item either at the time of questionnaire administration or telephone follow-up.
- 8 - Nonresponse. No response to an item other than a legitimate nonresponse or skip.
- 9 - Legitimate nonresponse. Based on a preceding response, the item should not be answered.

These codes apply to variables with single-column data fields. For variables with data fields greater than one column, the leftmost columns are 9 filled (e.g., 96, 996, 9996, 99996).

7. ORGANIZATION AND CONTENT OF THE DATA FILES

The parent data file consists of 6,564 records. The physical tape consists of three files, in the indicated order:

1. Parent Data File (BLKSIZE = 8592; LRECL = 537)

2. SPSS Control Card File for the Parent Data File (BLKSIZE = 4560; LRECL = 80)¹
3. Machine Readable Codebook (BLKSIZE = 4560, LRECL = 80)

The sections below refer to the parent data file. The variables are grouped by type and are positioned on the parent data file in the following order:

1. Identification Codes
2. Adjusted Parent Design Weight
3. Parent Questionnaire Data

7.1. Identification Codes

The first variable on the file is a two-digit record identification code (RECDTYPE). The code for the parent data file is 06. Next is a one-digit variable identifying the school sample type (SCHLTYPE) followed by a random four-digit school code (SCHOOLID) and a two-digit student code (STUDNTID). The school code is used to group together students from the same school. The school code and the student code taken together form a unique code (CASEID) for identifying individual records. Other variables identify the grade level (GRADE, one-digit, sophomore = 1, senior = 2), the school's geographic region according to the nine U.S. census regions (CENRGN, one-digit), and the language (SPANLANG, English = 0, Spanish = 1) in which the questionnaire was written.

7.2. Adjusted Design Weight

The variable DESIGNWT is a 15-digit number representing the adjusted parent design weight. The form of the number is 4 integers, decimal, and 10 decimal places. A description of this variable was given in section 4.3.

¹This file is designed to facilitate use with a standard statistical software package (SPSS = Statistical Package for the Social Sciences) by containing the control cards used by that system. With alterations, the same file can be used for another statistical package, SAS (Statistical Analysis System).

Caution: The identical mnemonic is used for the weight variable in the student file. Users who merge parent and student data (SPSS or SAS files) must rename either the parent or student weight variable.

7.3. Parent Questionnaire Data

The parent-of-senior questionnaire contains 72 questions and the parent-of-sophomore questionnaire contains 68 questions. Of the total, 58 questions are common to both questionnaires which means that the number of unique questions from the two questionnaires is 24. This section of the data file contains data from both questionnaires. The general order of the data follows that of the parent-of-senior questionnaires. Unique parent-of-sophomore data interspersed among the parent-of-senior data so that parent-of-sophomore data remain in the same order as the questionnaire. A description of the identification code used to identify all variables is provided in section 8.

8. GUIDE TO THE CODEBOOK

The codebook provides comprehensive information about the parent file to aid the user in working with the data. For each questionnaire item, a variable label and the response categories are printed along with the frequency count for the total parent-of-senior and parent-of-sophomore samples. If the question is comparable to one in the student questionnaires, that information is included here. A description of the contents of the codebook follows. Information indicated in sections 8.1 through 8.4 is given for each item.

8.1. Variable Identifier

The variable identifier is a three-part descriptor that identifies (1) the questionnaire on which the item is found, (2) the year of the data

collection, and (3) the question number. The variable descriptor varies from 5 to 8 characters depending on the complexity of the question:

- A. The first 2 characters (left-justified) indicates the source of the question.

- PE--Parent-of-Senior (Parent of Elder)
 - PY--Parent-of-Sophomore (Parent-of-Younger)
 - PB--Common to Both Parent-of-Senior and Parent-of-Sophomore Questionnaires (Parent - Both)

- B. The third character indicates the year the data were collected. For the base year "B" is the code.
- C. Characters 4 through 8 indicate the question number.

If the question appears in only one of the questionnaires, the number in the variable identifier is the same as that on the questionnaire. For example, question 12 in the parent-of-sophomore questionnaire is unique to that questionnaire and is identified as PYB12. If the question appears on both of the parent questionnaires, the variable identifier uses the question number from the senior questionnaire. For example, question 17A in the parent-of-senior questionnaire and question 13A in the parent-of-sophomore questionnaire are identical. The variable identifier in the codebook is PBB17A, the question number in the parent-of-senior questionnaire. (The question number in the sophomore questionnaire is also seven in the codebook.)

8.2. Variable Label

A short label appears after the variable identifier. This label is the same as that which appears in the SPSS data definition card file.

8.3. Tape Position

For each item on the tape its corresponding tape position is given.

8.4. Original questionnaire numbers

Reference to the question number in the original instrument(s) appear in parentheses below the variable information. If the question appears in both of the parent questionnaires both question numbers are given.

8.5 Response categories and frequency counts

The entry for item ends with the response categories and unweighted frequency counts. This section of the code book is self-explanatory and is similar in layout to standard SPSS or SAS frequency tables.




