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


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Data Anomalies - Logical Errors

- Some data values are modified using editing or imputation procedures
- Changes are sometimes made because answers to questions did not make sense based on answers to related questions



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Data Reporting Considerations

- SSOCS data can only be used for aggregate reporting
 - o Data are not representative of any one particular school
- Conclusions about causality between school characteristics and crime cannot be made
- Many questions in the SSOCS data set are interrelated
- Become familiar with the survey questions and with school crime and safety topics before analyzing SSOCS data
- Review standard error estimates for any means derived from SSOCS data before reporting results
 - NCES standards require that tables containing estimates with high standard errors should be footnoted, and in some cases cell values blanked out, to avoid misinterpretation

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Data Limitations

- SSOCS data can be used to
 - o Make inferences about regular public schools, public charter schools, and public schools that have partial or total magnet programs in the United States with regard to their safety and crime
- SSOCS data cannot be used to
 - Describe safety and crime at schools outside of the 50 states and the District of Columbia
 - o Describe excluded schools such as Bureau of Indian Education schools, special education schools, vocational schools, alternative schools, ungraded schools, virtual schools, and preschool and Kindergarten only schools
 - o Produce state-level estimates
 - o Track changes in individual schools over time
