No Child Left Behind Act

Each State shall...

Develop and implement a single statewide accountability system that will be effective in ensuring that all local educational agencies and public schools make adequate yearly progress.





Georgia Code 20-14-26

- To create, with the approval of the State Board of Education (SBOE), a performance-based accountability system;
- > To establish indicators of performance;
- Rate schools and systems;
- Develop annual report cards;

> Develop a single statewide accountability system for schools and systems incorporating federal law, rules, and regulations.

What is the Alliance of Education Agency Heads?



2) Performance Index

The Performance Index includes two components for each public school that detail the Percentage of Students Meeting and Exceeding Standards and the gain or loss of that percentage from the previous year.

The Governor's Office of Student Achievement (GOSA) awards those schools with the Highest Percentage of Students Meeting and Exceeding Standards and those with the Greatest Gain in Percentage of Students Meeting and Exceeding Standards.

Criteria were developed comparing the most recent two years of Criterion Referenced Competency Test (CRCT) (grades 1-8 in reading, English/language arts, math, social studies, and science) and/or the Georgia High School Graduation Test (grade 11 first time test takers - English/language arts, math, science, and social studies). Criteria were based on Full Academic Year (FAY) students.

- The percentage of Students Meeting and Exceeding Standards in the current year is 96.5%.
- This percentage reflects a Gain over the prior year of 8.68%.
- This change was at or above 99.74% of the high schools in Georgia.
- This school received the 2006 Silver Award for Highest Percentage of Students Meeting and Exceeding Standards.
- This school received the 2006 Platinum Award for Greatest Gain in Percentage of Students Meeting and Exceeding Standards.

What is Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP)?

Adequate yearly progress (AYP) is a series of annual performance goals set by the state for each school district and school, as well as for the state as a whole. By participating in Title I, a voluntary federal program that provides more than \$11 billion to participating states to help educate low-income children, states agree to commit themselves to the goal of the federal No Child Left Behind Act: that all students will be proficient in reading/language arts and mathematics, as determined by state assessments, by 2014.




